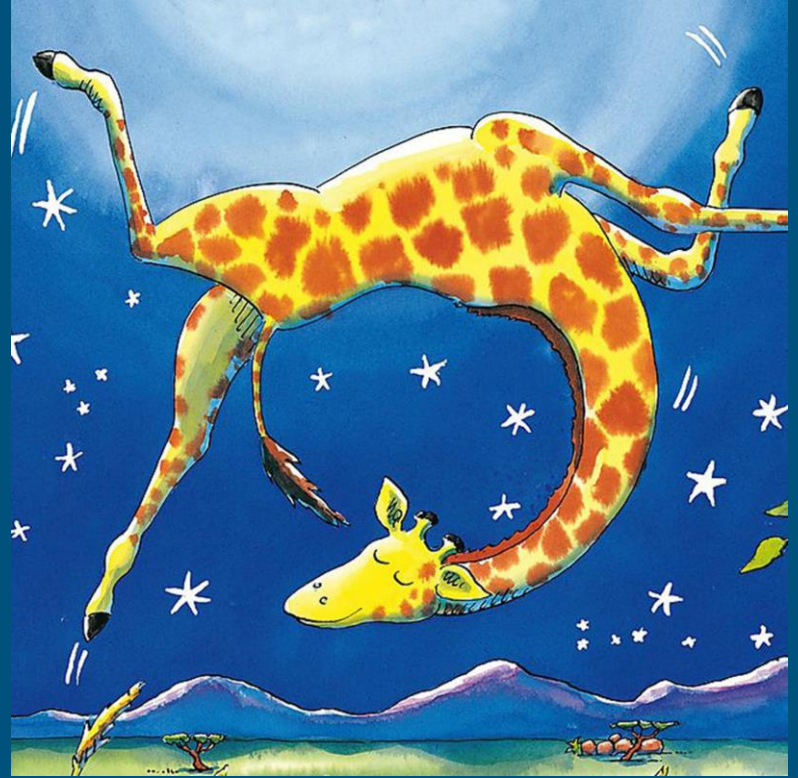
Be a team player

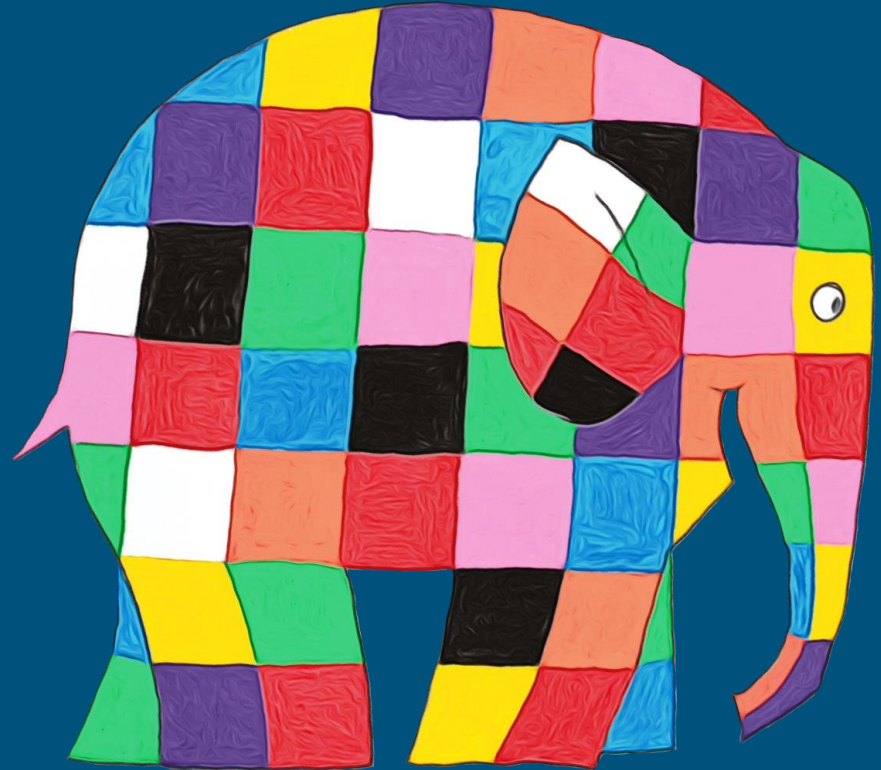
Be brave
