Year 1





Date of Birth:
14th November 1948

Start of Reign:
10th September 2022

Charity Work:
In 1976, he founded The Prince's Trust. This charity was created to help young people in need in the UK by supporting them with with employment, education and training.

Early Life:
King Charles III was the first child of Princess Chelsea (later Queen Elizabeth II). He was born before becoming King Charles III, he was known as Prince Charles. He trained with the Royal Air Force (RAF) and also served in the Royal Navy.


Family:
His children was William, Prince of Wales (born 1982) and Prince Harry (born 1984). His grandchildren were Prince George (born 2013), Princess Charlotte (born 2015) and Prince Louis (born 2018).
Archdeacon, Monasticism - Windsor (born 1974) and The Duke of York (born 1962).

Interesting Facts:
King Charles III has raised awareness of environmental issues such as climate change. He has written a number of books including the children's book 'The Old Man of Lochnagar'.



In Year 3 we looked at designs of British coins and the symbols on them then made our own designs to commemorate the new monarch. We also thought of which questions we would like to ask King Charles III. We wanted to know how he felt about this momentous occasion, his thoughts on the design of the crown and even what his favourite games and hobbies are! ‘If the King did something wrong, would you be swearing to be faithful to him even if it was wrong?’


‘The Kings and Queens make a pledge to serve the country, so we should do the same’
