End of Year Expectations for Year Three



This booklet provides information for parents and carers on the end of year expectations for children in our school. The staff have identified these expectations as being the minimum requirements your child must meet in order to ensure continued progress throughout the following year. All the objectives will be worked on throughout the year and will be the focus of direct teaching.

Any extra support you can provide in helping your children to achieve these is greatly valued. Statements achieved will be highlighted and new targets dated so progress can be shared and next steps supported more effectively.

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<u>Reading</u>



- Listen to and discuss fiction, poetry, plays and nonfiction
- Increase their familiarity with a wide range of stories, including fairy stories and traditional tales, and re-tell some of these orally
- Comprehension
- Use dictionaries to clarify the meaning of new words
- Identify themes in a wide range of books
- Discuss words and phrases that capture the reader's interest and imagination (Reading Log)



- Ask questions to improve their understanding of a text
- Identify main ideas from more than 1 paragraph
- Retrieve and recall information from non-fiction books
- Draw and justify inferences with evidence
- Predict what may happen next from details read

<u>Writing</u>



Spelling & Handwriting

• Use the first 2 or 3 letters of a word to check its spelling in a

dictionary

- Spell further homophones correctly
- Use the diagonal and horizontal strokes needed to join letters <u>Composition</u>
- Use fronted adverbials with commas appropriately
- Use conjunctions, adverbs and prepositions to express time and cause
- Extend use of subordination to include 'although'
- Plan by discussing and recording ideas, using writing similar to
- that which I am doing

- Write in paragraphs around a theme
- In non-fiction, continue to use organisational devices such as headings and sub-headings
- Proof-read for spelling and punctuation errors
- Read my writing with appropriate intonation and controlling the

tone and volume of my voice so the make meaning clear



• Compare & order numbers up to 1000 Multiply 2-digit by 1-digit

- Read & write all numbers to 1000 in digits and words
- Count from 0 in multiples of 4, 8, 50 and 100; find

10 or 100 more/less than a given number


Maths

- Recall & use multiplication & division facts for 2, 3, 4, 5, 8 and 10 times tables
- Recognise place value of each 3-digit number
- Add and subtract: 3-digit number and ones; 3-digit number and tens; 3-digit number and hundreds
- Add & subtract numbers with up to 3-digits using written column method
- Estimate and use inverse to check

- Count up and down in tenths
- Compare and order fractions with same denominator
- Add & subtract fractions with same denominator
- Tell the time, to the nearest minute, using 12 & 24 hour clocks and using Roman numerals.
