



## February Update: *Safeguarding Matters*

### Year 6 Bikeability



Year 6 completed their Bikeability training at the beginning of the academic year, learning about the Highway Code, basic bike maintenance and how to control their bicycles while cycling on roads, including safely navigating junctions. As they are beginning to stretch their wings in the run-up to secondary school, this gives them valuable skills in keeping safe while becoming slowly more independent.

### Year 2 Road Safety Session

This month, Year 2 attended a virtual workshop about the Green Cross Code and how to cross a road safely. Along with children from over 51 other schools they were Road Safety Detectives and found out about staying safe by answering questions, joining in chants and learning songs. They learnt the six key points to staying safe (see right).







## Years R, 1 and 2: Road Safety Magic Show



In January, children from Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 had a special treat when the Road Safety Magic Show visited Langrish. The children absolutely loved the mixture of magic and comedy, and it was a great way of reinforcing a number of important road safety messages, including the importance of bright clothes, bicycle helmets, and the magic words: stop, look, listen and think.

Putting these messages across in such a fun-filled and memorable way is a brilliant method of ensuring the children know exactly how to be safe when they're out and about, riding their bikes or scooters, or crossing the road.

## Keeping Safe near the Railways

Thanks to Network Rail 's community safety team who came into school last week to deliver assemblies to Key Stage 1 & 2. 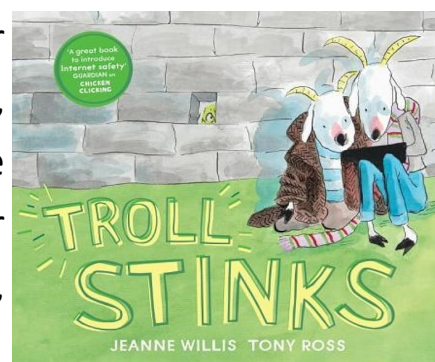


### Year 1



Safer Internet Day was a day full of stories in Year 1. In assembly, Mrs Pruden discussed the book 'Troll Stinks' about the importance of being kind online. We then heard two stories featuring Mo and Jaz, both of which emphasised the message that we should always tell a trusted grown-up whenever we encounter anything on the Internet

that we don't understand, or that makes us feel worried, scared or sad. This in turn reminded us of the 'Funny Tummy Song' from our previous online safety learning with 'Jessie and Friends', which the children asked to view again, before we finally read 'The Pop-Up Gremlins' and completed our Safer Internet Day activity booklets, including colouring, a word search, and designing an online safety poster.



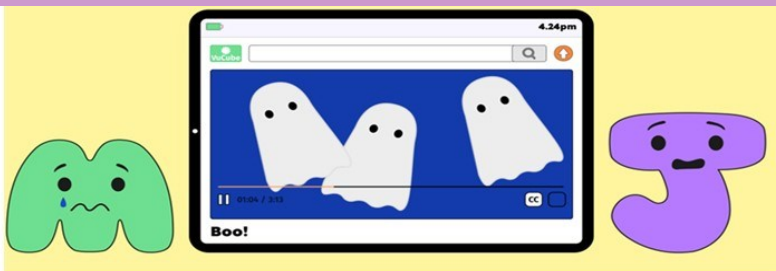


## Safer Internet Day

### Year 2

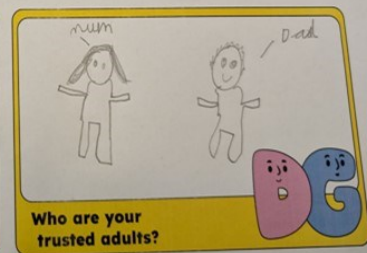
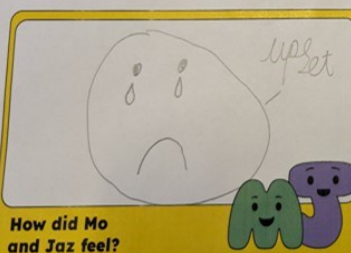
We looked at the story of Mo and Jaz who were watching some videos online. When their video had finished another video started playing which they didn't like. We discussed what they should do.

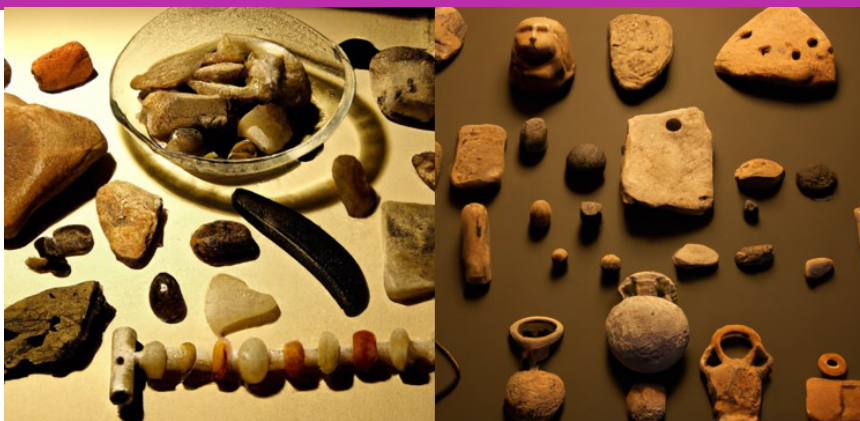
"I don't like this video," says Mo. "I feel worried."

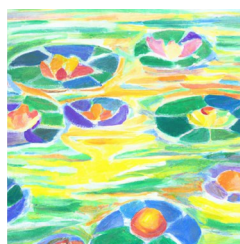
### Year 3

Year 3 joined a fascinating BBC live lesson all about the risks of AI-generated content, fake news and misinformation. We then put our detective skills to the test by examining two photos of "Stone Age artefacts", using our history topic knowledge to try and spot the AI-generated forgery. The children's insights were very helpful and they correctly identified that both contained misleading information! Well done! We also decided upon rules for us to follow to help keep us safe from misleading information online. We then used AI in a more positive way to create exemplars for our art projects!

Some of our pledges include:

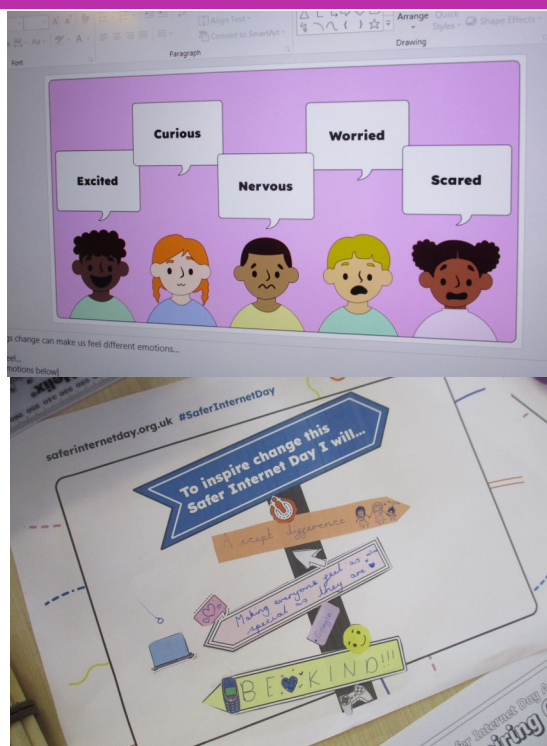
"We can be careful what we share, to make sure it doesn't effect people negatively or make them upset"

"To create apps/chats that are rude word free—keeping things positive!"

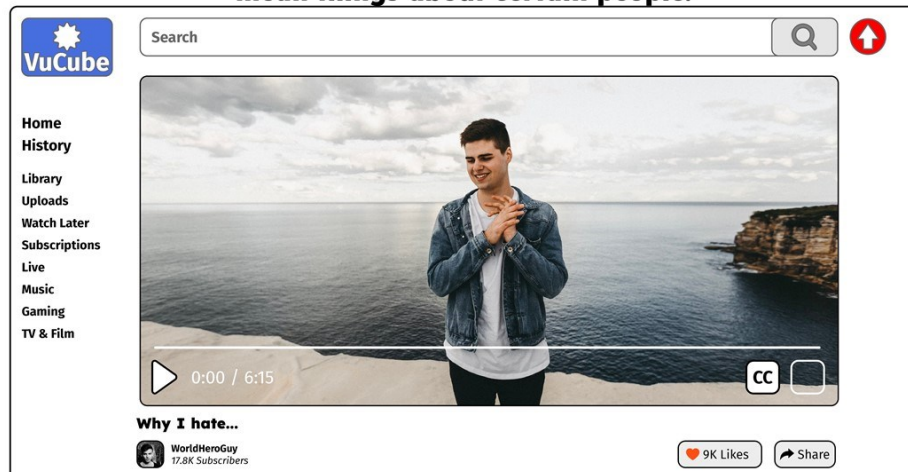




## Safer Internet Day

We considered how the internet influences us. Inspired by different scenarios, the children discussed positive and negative influences and their possible impact on us:

'Using mobile phones can be useful to contact someone in a ne emergency but you have to be careful who you re talking to on the phone.'

'You have to be careful what you watch online; if you see 'social media influencers' who are being mean, it's best not to watch these.'

'Smart watches can be a good thing as they help you to monitor your fitness but they can also be a distraction.'
