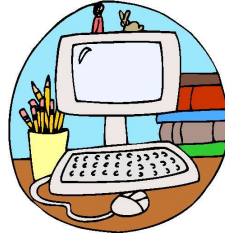


Langrish School E-Safety Agreement



At Langrish, we are committed to the use of computer technologies and recognise the Internet as a valuable tool for learners of all ages. However, we also acknowledge that computers, tablets and other Internet-enabled devices do have the potential for inappropriate use and access to undesirable material from which we have a duty of care to protect our pupils.

In order to fulfil that duty of care, Langrish School will:

- Use a filtered Internet service to prevent access to sites containing inappropriate material.
- Ensure that all Internet access within the school is supervised by an adult.
- Continue to maintain a high standard of safeguarding training for our staff, including e-safety.
- Use age-appropriate lessons, assemblies and resources to educate our pupils about the responsible use of technology, enabling them to make the most of the Internet by equipping them with strategies for dealing with some of the threats, dangers and challenges they may face in the online world.

Year 6's Internet Safety Guidelines



Respect the privacy of yourself and others online as you would in person

Keep personal information private and passwords secure

Be aware of the information you share about yourself and how it can be used online. Do not share information about others without their consent.

Check and follow reviews and age limits when requesting new apps and games; gain consent from your adults for these

Be open about online activity, including the use of AI and its positive and negative effects

Mute chats, or remove the chat function, when playing online or unplug headphones so adults can hear what is being said.

Make sure you only interact with people you know. If someone unknown contacts you, report this to an adult.

Ensure online use is in a family space where adults are available if needed

Don't be afraid to report your friends' online behaviour if it is inappropriate; know how to block and report

When using messaging apps, be open with your parents about who you are talking to and be respectful of the groups' participants: if you wouldn't say it in person, don't say it
